CARDINAL SPELLMAN TO VISIT THE FAIR TODAY

His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, and directors of the Vatican Pavilion, today will lead approximately forty-five priests from the eastern section of the country to a briefing at the Fair. John Young of the Fair staff is scheduled to escort the party from the Chancery offices in Manhattan.

The directors of the Vatican Pavilion who are expected to attend today's event are Msgr. James W. Asip, Msgr. Timothy J. Flynn, Msgr. Francis M. Costello and Rev. Raymond Leonard. The Most Reverend Bryan J. McEntegart, Bishop of Brooklyn, will also attend the luncheon.

Representing individual dioceses on the Atlantic coast and as far west as Chicago, the forty-five diocesan priests will hear details of the Vatican Pavilion, inspect the Fair model, view the Vatican film and tour the grounds. Mr. Moses will serve as host at a luncheon for the Cardinal and his party to be followed by a meeting with Fair officials. The purpose of the day is to alert the diocesan clergy of the national appeal for funds to construct and operate the Vatican Pavilion. The pulpit appeal and collection is scheduled for May 26th throughout the United States.






