





## SHOW'S THE THING One of the most imaginative and exciting shows at the 1964-65 New York World's Fair is the Ford Pavilion which incorporates Walt Disney's Wonder Rotunda and Magic Skyway. Sixty-four pylons, each a hundred feet high, outline the perimeter of the glass-walled

Rotunda which houses the enchanting International Gardens. (See page 3.)



to the upper level of the Pavilion past humorous tableaux that recapture the fun and fickleness of early motoring. Here you board a moving platform which picks you up and takes you to a bright new Ford convertible for a trip along the Magic Skyway, the big show at the Pavilion. This ride, inspired and constructed by Walt Disney, takes you first through a glass-enclosed tunnel encircling the Rotunda for a panoramic view of the fairgrounds. Then you enter the flared exhibit building into the misty vapors and shadowy half-light of the



From the ground level showroom "speed ramps" - escalators without steps - take you

swampy and rugged terrain. Then you hear violent rumblings and you're suddenly in the midst of volcanic eruptions, signaling the end of the dinosaur era and the birth of man. Communities of cave people now come to life before your eyes. They raise their eyebrows, blink, wave, smile and utter sounds. You see them make fire, hunt animals, paint crude figures and symbols on cave walls and even invent the wheel. Having passed through the era of the caveman, you find yourself riding a highway into the sky towards "Space City," Disney's "time tunnel" of the future. Towering spires of metal, glistening domes of glass and other elements of an abstract metropolitan center surround you. In this fanciful sequence, you almost feel that you're gliding along at a great height through a city built in space. When your ride ends, you stroll at your leisure past a collection of fantastic futuristic automotive designs on your way to the Product Parade. Before leaving, make sure you check in at one of the two "Geographs" where


you'll be given a state (or country) tag to wear as a memento of your visit.


